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I. Affluence and Its Anxieties

- Prosperity boom
 - Housing:
 - Fabulous surge in home construction
 - 1960: 25% of all homes had been built in decade of 1950s
 - » 83% of those new houses in suburbia
 - Science and technology:
 - Invention of transistor (1948) sparked revolution in electronics, especially computers
 - First electronic computers were massive machines
 - Computer giant International Business Machine (IBM) prototype of “high-tech” corporation in new “information age”

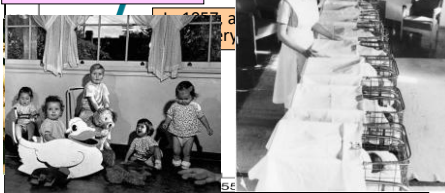
1957 → 1 baby born every 7 seconds

a rise in the birthrate



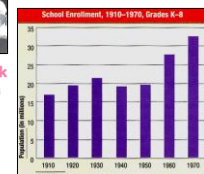

1949 → William Levitt produced 150 houses per week.



\$7,990 or \$60/month with no down payment.

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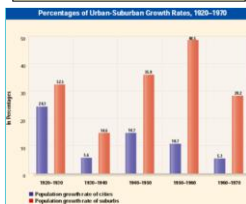


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Suburbs boomed in the 1950s

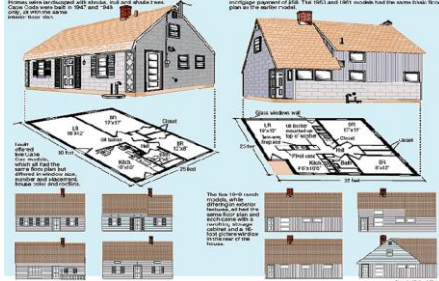
The 1947 Cape Cod
The Levitt Cape Cod is a beautiful, comfortable

South waver. The kitchen was in the front - at the time a novel approach - and WC bathrooms were in the rear. I rented for \$50-65 per month, depending on the lot, and was offered for sale a year later at \$7,500. Homes were landscaped with shrubs, tulip and rhododendrons. Cape Cods were built in 1947 and '48 only, at virtually the same time.

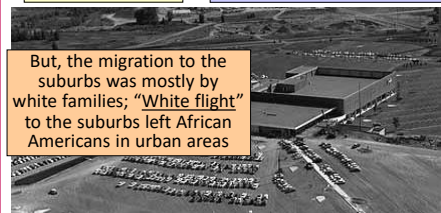
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Suburbs changed American life

Suburbs increased America's need for cars & highways

Churches, schools, grocery stores, & shopping centers were build to service the suburbs

But, the migration to the suburbs was mostly by white families; "White flight" to the suburbs left African Americans in urban areas

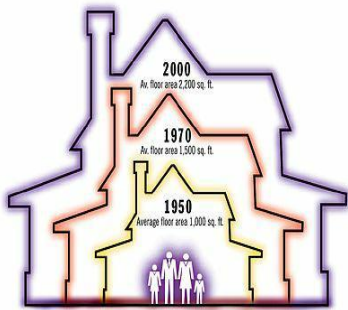

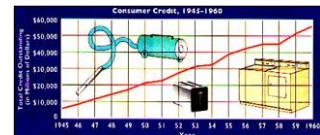

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3a. Consumerism

1950 → Introduction of the Diner's Card



All babies were potential consumers who spearheaded a brand-new market for food, clothing, and shelter.

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Consumer Culture in the Fifties

- As 1950s closed:
 - Americans becoming free-spending consumers of mass-produced, standardized products
 - Critics lamented implications of new consumerist lifestyle:
 - David Riesman, *The Lonely Crowd* (1950), portrayed postwar generation as pack of conformists
 - As did William H. Whyte, *The Organization Man* (1956)
 - And Sloan Wilson, *The Man in the Gray Flannel Suit* (1955)
 - John Kenneth Galbraith bemoaned spectacle of private opulence amidst public squalor in *The Affluent Society* (1958)
 - His call for more investment in public good ignored during affluent 1950s

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4A. A Changing Workplace

Automation:

1947-1957 → factory workers decreased by 4.3%, eliminating 1.5 million blue-collar jobs.

By 1956 → more white-collar than blue-collar jobs in the U. S.

Computers → **Mark I** (1944). First IBM mainframe computer (1951).

Corporate Consolidation:

By 1960 → 600 corporations (1/2% of all U. S. companies) accounted for 53% of total corporate income.

WHY?? Cold War military buildup.

Car registrations: 1945 → 25,000,000
1960 → 60,000,000

2-family cars doubles from 1951-1958

1959 Chevy Corvette

1956 → **Interstate Highway Act** → largest public works project in American history!

▲ Cost \$32 billion.

▲ 41,000 miles of new highways built.

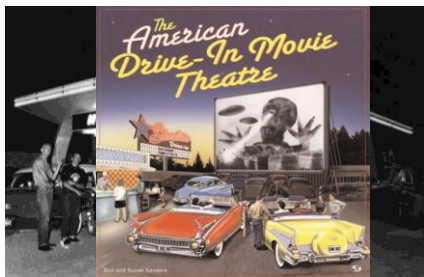

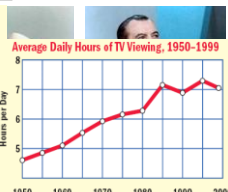
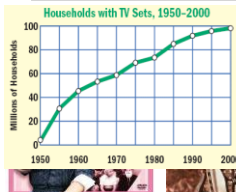
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Americans enjoyed new forms of entertainment

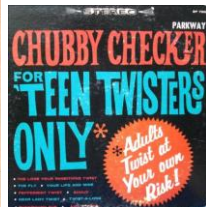
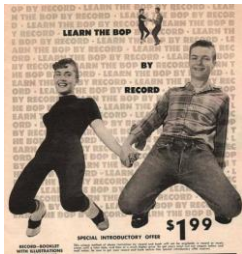


Suburban teens had leisure time & money to spend

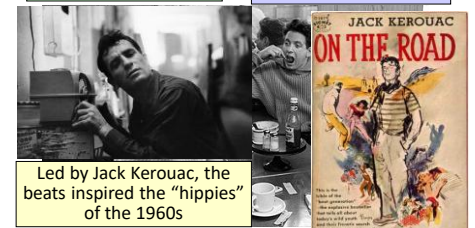
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The "beat movement" rejected conformity

"Beatniks" were artists & writers who lived non-conformist lives

They rejected the suburbs, consumerism, & "regular jobs"



Led by Jack Kerouac, the beats inspired the "hippies" of the 1960s

3. **Reverend Billy Graham** → ecumenical message; warned against the evils of Communism.



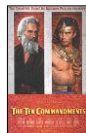

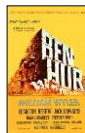

The ideal modern woman married, cooked and cared for her family, and kept herself busy by joining the local PTA and leading a troop of Campfire Girls. She entertained guests in her family's suburban house and worked out on the trampoline to keep her size 12 figure.

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The media promoted women as mothers & homemakers, but almost 40% of mothers had jobs



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Affluence and Its Anxieties

– Women and industry:

- Surge in white-collar employment opened special opportunities for women
- After WWII, many women left paid work
- A "cult of domesticity" emerged in popular culture to celebrate eternal feminine functions of wife and mother
- Quite revolution occurred:
 - Of 40 million new jobs created from 1950-1980,
 - more than 30 million jobs in clerical and service work
- "Pink-collar ghetto" were occupations dominated by women

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Affluence and Its Anxieties

- Urban age and women:
 - Women's new dual role: *both worker and homemaker* raised urgent questions:
 - About family,
 - And traditional definitions of gender differences
 - Feminist Betty Friedan:
 - *The Feminine Mystique* (1963): a classic of feminist protest literature that launched modern women's movement
 - Criticized stifling boredom of suburban housewifery

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9a. Well-Defined Gender Roles

Changing Sexual Behavior:

Alfred Kinsey:

1948 → *Sexual Behavior in the Human Male*

1953 → *Sexual Behavior in the Human Female*

- ✓ Premarital sex was common.
- ✓ Extramarital affairs were frequent among married couples.

Kinsey's results are an assault on the family as a basic unit of society, a negation of moral law, and a celebration of licentiousness.

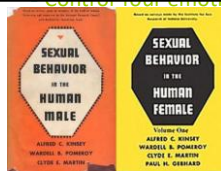

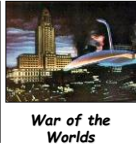

Assess the validity of the above statement and explain how the decade of the 1950s laid the groundwork for the social and political turbulence of the 1960s.

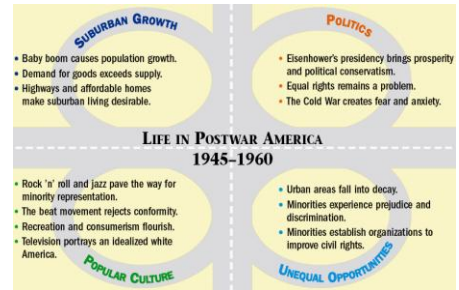
